Pondering Navigation



I get interested in many unusual things especially related to navigation. I discovered that the Polynesians were master navigators who tracked their way across huge expanses of ocean without any of the complex aids, such as a sextant, compass, or chronometer. How did they do it? Like all navigators they used the stars as fixed points of reference and they understood the significance of stationary clouds, the presence of birds and flotsam as indications of nearby land. But most extraordinary of all, they had learned to read and interpret the changing patterns created by ocean waves. The a stone thrown in a pond will set up a series

of ripples. Any object, like a rock or even a mooring post, which breaks the surface, will effect the pattern of the ripples. The Polynesians observed that whether in a pond or on the Pacific Ocean, the same principle applies. When waves hit an Island or Atoll some are reflected back from the direction they from which they had come while others are deflected at angles round the island and continue their patterns in a modified pattern. The mystery is twofold, number one is how the knowledge was past from generation to generation without complex books and manuals. Number two, how accurate the navigators were as they developed uncharted (but repeated) routes across the Pacific Ocean and to the various islands. Knowledge is often mystical. I am amazed. It doesn't bother me, but; I do spend a lot of time pondering.


